

- How successfully are we engaging offsite






- Where we started
 - In 2000 Australian Museum began Video Conferencing via ISDN lines.
- Where we went
 - In March 2009 the Australian Museum purchased a mobile TANDBERG video conferencing unit.
 - With support from the NSW Distance and Rural Technologies DART started running events in May.
 - In the first 6 months we had reached over 3000 students from 115 classes

















- We are expanding each year
 - 2009, 115 class, 3000 students
 - 2010, 42 events, 202 classes, 6500 students
 - 2011, 120 events, so far 140 classes 4200 students
- Most topic are adaptations of existing programs
- We run free trials for new topics to see how they work with a virtual audience
- We change or cut programs that don't work





• Where are we going

- We are integrating VC equipment into our 3 new teaching spaces
- In 2012 we hope to run 250 events, reaching 20,000 from 600 classes
